I got I got pretty good with time management because you know, some of the classes, as you probably know, they're all over the place. Sometimes you have to take classes in the morning. And definitely Kevin the flexibility of my work. That was a huge help and learning time management skills.

But my advice is don't get discouraged find a way to manage your classes to fit in your classes with your work schedule. Even if you take one class at a time, two classes at a time. Just stay focused and don't get discouraged.

I was very fortunate. I stay at my at the job I had at the time, I was a youth care professional when I was in school. And the supervisor I had at the time, she helped me train to become a case manager. And that was the focus of in the aim for me after finish school. So I was

very fortunate to have a job lined up after I graduated. I think that is every college seniors dream right to have that ready to go. And you certainly worked hard to make that happen.

So how did you get from that position to your current role?

Yes, I have to agree with you, I think I was definitely I was very fortunate to have that opportunity to have a job lined up. Because I did see some of my classmates at the time struggling a little bit to find a job or, you know, they were feeling the stress of finding the job after graduation. So after I graduated, and I became a case manager for for the youth, I wanted to do something else I wanted to work with the different population. I started working for the State of Illinois as a caseworker before I got to be where I'm at as a senior care coordinator. But I find out very soon that being a caseworker for the state of Illinois wasn't very fulfilling. And then I get this opportunity to become caseworker or a case manager for the elderly population.

I think that's such an interesting population. And I would love to hear more about your choice to work with them. I think that can be an intimidating population for people, especially students that are just graduating. So tell us about your work with the elderly?

Nayeli Lechuga-Knight 7:10

Well, I like to start by saying that I love this job. I love what I do. I love working with the with the aging population. I think unfortunately, they're one of the most vulnerable populations in our society. And I love the fact that I have the opportunity to provide them with resources and in sources that they will need on a daily basis.

Nayeli Lechuga-Knight 7:42

My favorite part of the job is definitely interacting with my participants or my clients, getting to know them have more of a personal like relationship with them, but also remaining professional, but also getting to know, you know, like there needs getting to know what their strengths or weaknesses are and finding the right resources for them and knowing that knowing that I was able to help somebody, yeah, I imagine leaving the office at the end of the day, knowing that you help someone is a feeling that has to be unmatched.

And what a wonderful career and how fulfilling that must be. And then I know on the flip side, there have to be some challenges, what do you consider to be the most challenging thing about your job?

Oh, my gosh, yes, I think the most challenging part is navigating through the different policies, because we work side to side with the Illinois Department on Aging. And we also work under the policies of the Department of Human Services and HFS. So navigating the different policies, rules, the different information on insurance, that is definitely some of the most complicated part of my job. And also like, you know, we work with the, with the aging population, and we work with the with individuals or are on the end of life sometimes and losing some of those individuals is also very difficult.
